

LEANNE GLOVER
Cor Anglais

Leanne Glover completed a
Bachelor of Music with first class
honours at the University of
Western Australia, where she
studied with Joel Marangella.

During her studies she won the Dr V.H. Cooper Prize for Most Outstanding First Year Student and twice claimed the Margaret Bellos Chamber Music Performance Prize.



Ms Glover earned three scholarships to continue her studies: The WA Art Council Award, an international Study Grant from the Music Board of the Australia Council and the John Hind Memorial Scholarship. This gave her the opportunity to study for a year in Amsterdam with Han de Vries and then in Zurich with Emmanuel Abbuel and Thomas Indermuhle for three years, where she gained a postgraduate degree in Performance. She was also awarded a grant from the City of Zurich.

Upon her return to Perth, Leanne obtained a permanent position with the West Australian Symphony Orchestra and at different times has held the position of Second Oboe, Associate Principal Oboe and then acted in the Principal Oboe role for 4 years.

In 2011 Leanne won the position of Principle Cor Anglais and remained in that position until 2022.

In 2013 Leanne had the honour of being invited to perform with the Australian World Orchestra under the baton of Zubin Mator. For many years Leanne taught oboe at both The West Australian Academy of Performing Arts and The University of Western Australia.

Currently she is a busy performing musician in many smaller ensembles around Perth.

Listening Guide

All That Glisters (Fanfare for Orchestra) IAIN GRANDAGE

In just over four minutes, Australian-born composer lain Grandage transforms the mysterious enormity of his homeland's natural landscape into something startlingly intimate. Speckled throughout with the recurring appearance of the glockenspiel, this short, shimmering piece is an experience similar to that of navigating the desert by starlight. Each percussive sprite emanating from the glockenspiel serves as a guidance beacon for the listener, a journey through unknown territories represented by the delicate, billowing rumbles of brass and the soft bristling of strings.

Bearing similarities to the strings-laden second movement of American composer's John Adams' Naïve and Sentimental Music, itself an ode to the hushed vastness of the Californian woodlands, All That Glisters relies on a charged, wavering excitement from the brass to recreate the excitement of exploring new, borderless terrains.



Peer Gynt, Mvt. 1: "Morning Mood" EDVARD GRIEG

Rivalled only by Beethoven's "Pastoral" Symphony, Grieg's "Morning Mood" is perhaps the world's most famous piece of music when conjuring images of peaceful green meadows and wind-rustled woods. Opening with a playful, ascendant melody on flute – a bird call of sorts answered in return by the clarinet – these sprightly woodwinds are soon accompanied by a glorious flurry of strings that represent the shimmering light of sunrise.

The lasting appeal of Grieg's piece – which has long held its place within popular culture as musical shorthand for 'serenity' in countless films and TV shows – is rooted in how gracefully it captures the hesitant excitement of a new day. The opening melody, sleepy and cyclical, quickly progresses from the cheerful yawns of the flute to the luminous dandelion tufts of violin, invigorating the piece in much the same way as morning air can activate even the drowsiest of bed-dwellers.

Excerpts from Planet Earth I: Angel Falls and The Snow Geese GEORGE FENTON

Produced across a mammoth four-year period, spanning more than 2,000 days of shooting in 62 locations, BBC nature series Planet Earth has since become a landmark in the history of documentary television. Securing the show's legacy in no small part since its original 2006 broadcast is the work of British composer George Fenton, who utilises a variety of orchestral colours and textures as diverse as the wildlife depicted onscreen.

As a celebration of the limitless wonder and awe of the natural world, Planet Earth serves as a perfect companion piece among our selection of nature-theme pieces tonight. The two selected here offer a lush, expansive imagining of windswept plains, complete with swaying strings and singing brass. The Snow Geese, in particular, features triumphant brass voices suggestive of flight and open exploration of the skies, while Angel Falls creates a charming sense of wonder with its playful harp flutters, atop a body of bold trumpet and shimmering cymbals.

Glass Ocean (feat. Leanne Glover, solo cor anglais)
ELLA MACENS
WA Premiere

Having always loved the ocean and the sense of calm it brought her, Australian composer Ella Macens set out to convey through music the wonder of the aquatic world. In approaching the artistic viewpoint of this piece, Macens imagined what it would be like to slice the ocean in half and to view the immense diversity of colours, shapes, and textures beneath the sea as if through an enormous clear sheet of glass. In celebrating that beauty, Macens also underlines the fragility of the ecosystem thriving below the waves, and the importance of its protection.

Originally composed for oboist Dinah Woods and the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra, the piece debuted in 2019 and tonight receives its Western Australian premiere. Perth-based oboist Leanne Glover performs solo cor anglais, marking her first appearance with WACO, in a piece she describes as "powerfully evocative and written so perfectly for the cor anglias."

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Grand Canyon Suite, Mvt. 4 ("Sunset") and Mvt. 5 ("Cloudburst") FERDE GROFÉ

Grofé's 1931 Grand Canyon Suite illustrates in music an ambitious trip undertaken by the composer in 1916, with each of its five movements conveying the experience of a particular tableau within the work's eponymous setting. The two pieces selected, the closing movements, represent the extremity of nature's opposing states, building from a radiant sense of wonder to a crescendo of explosive, flashing drama.

The first of the two movements, Mvt. 4: "Sunset", ushers a sense of calm awe with triumphant opening bars for trumpet, followed by a sparkle of triangle and lulled piano arpeggios as a reflection of the lazy grandeur of the sun rolling below the horizon. The piece gradually closes with yawning swathes of strings beneath quieter, gentle breaths of flute that sing out like the final rays of light evaporating into the sunless ether of a darkening sky. Musically, the piece 'sets' with a spritz of strings and the contemplative presence of harp.

The final movement, meanwhile – "Cloudburst" – provides much more dramatic colour, embodied with the gusto of a Bernstein concert work complete with bombastic drums, and shrill gusts of strings. Snarling trumpets and booming brass add to the drama, illustrating in sound the agitated, frantic energy of a lightning storm.

Hymn to the Sun with the Beat of Mother Earth SATOSHI YAGISAWA

Opening with a glistening flurry of brass and flute, the initial burst of gentle energy at the outset of Japanese composer's Hymn to the Sun is softened with sparkling percussive elements on piano and tubular bells. Commissioned for the Tokai City Wind Music Band's 40th anniversary celebrations in 2005, the theme of the piece revolves around that of family and the Band's expansion of new members, in both a professional and familial sense. It was during this four-decade period, of each player treating one another as a family, that the band became the eponymous Sun around which their world revolved.

Jovial percussive elements, ranging from drums to cymbals, colour the piece with a sparkling coat of sonic jubilance, infused throughout with mischievous, winding cycles of clarinet and flute, for a piece that crackles with radiant cheer and gleeful dynamism.

Symphony No. VI, The Blue Marble JULIE GIROUX *WA Premiere*

In this three-movement symphony, American composer Julie Giroux sets about to capture the vastness of space, the richness of sound in the heart of the Amazon rainforest, and the ultimate frail delicacy of life itself.

Designed for accompaniment with visual material reflective of each movement's specific themes, the work can be performed independent of projected imagery, but tonight receives its Western Australian premiere complete with accompanying visuals and sound effects.

Characterised by winding, buoyant updrafts of brass and tinkling shimmers of harp and xylophone, the opening movement soars in the style of John Williams's most adventurous film scores. The second movement, "Voices in Green", features the chirruping of avian wildlife in prerecorded audio to complement the bold voices of trumpet and playful piano trills, amidst hushed percussive shimmers that evoke the jovial singing of cicadas. The soaring, vibrant final movement brings all of these elements together in one grandiose conclusion to the motific ideas explored throughout.
