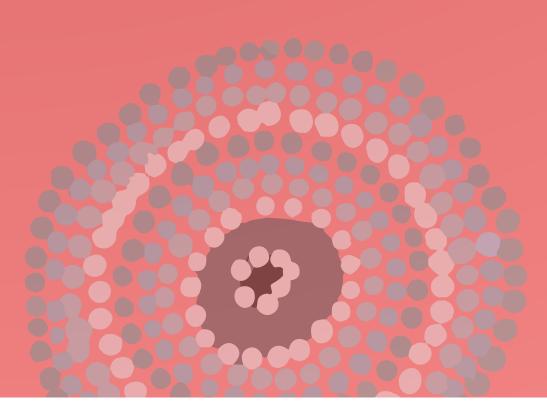

PROGRAMME NOTES

Overture from "Hansel and Gretel"

Born in Germany in 1854, Engelbert Humperdinck came from a non musical family, but from a young age he was playing and composing. Hansel and Gretel is by far Humperdinck's most famous work, described by the composer as a 'fairy tale opera' that was inspired by the Brothers Grimm fairytale of the same name. Humperdinck wrote the opera with the aid of his sister, Adelheid, who wrote the libretto for the opera, completed in 1892.

The overture opens with a serene brass chorale led by the horns, building into a playful brass fanfair, which then transitions into the main themes of the overture - a sweeping pastoral theme in the strings which is interspersed with vibrant dance motifs in the woodwinds.

'Scene' from "Swan Lake"

One of the most loved ballets of all time, Swan Lake showcases Tchaikovsky's ability to write sweeping orchestral accompaniment and heart wrenching melodies. The main theme of Swan Lake featuring a solo oboe, sets the scene for the tragedy to come, and the melody is actually an inversion of the swan theme from the end of Act

This was Tchaikovsky's first ballet score, and surprisingly, the premiere wasn't a success. It wasn't until after the composers death in 1893 that the ballet was restructured and choreographed anew to great success by the Mariinsky Theatre to the version we know and love.

'Waltz of the Flowers' from "The Nutcracker"

Pyotr Ilyich Tchaikovsky (1840-1893) was a Russian composer whose works included symphonies, concertos, operas, ballets, and chamber music. He displayed exceptional musical ability from an early age, improvising at the piano and composing his first song in 1844, aged four.

Tchaikovsky's iconic Waltz of the Flowers is a piece that features in the second act of his everloved festive ballet, The Nutcracker. The ballet was premiered at Christmastime in 1892, and has since been one of the most popular ballets in the world.

The lightheartedness of this ballet comes across in Tchaikovsky's playful music. He told his fellow musicians that "It's awfully fun to write a march for tin soldiers, and a waltz for flowers!" During this time Tchaikovsky was experiencing some emotional turmoil after the death of his sister. He famously used his fear of mice to create the dynamic music for the army of mice and the battle, and in Waltz of the Flowers he channeled the love he had for his sister to create the sweeping and iconic melodies.

'Hungarian March' from !'The Damnation of Faust"

The Rákóczi Song (then later March) was something of an unofficial national anthem of Hungary from the mid 17th century onwards. This piece was later adapted by several composers in the 19th century, most notably Berlioz and Liszt.

There is real swagger and dash to the 'Hungarian March' which provides the accompaniment to a section in the opera The Damnation of Faust, in which Faust glimpses the army in the distance. The Marches gilded brilliance and glib militarism contrast greatly with Faust's complicated ennui, which finds no answers in military glory or empty national pride.

"Peter Pan" Suite for Orchestra Narrated by Shanae Campbell

James Newton Howard, born in California in 1951 is a prolific and well loved composer, who has written score for films such as Batman begins, the Dark Knight, The Hunger Games series and Fantastic Beasts and Where to Find Them.

The score of Peter Pan features a large orchestra, and a narrator that guides us through the story. The score brings to life the fluttering movements of Tinkerbell, the joyful and chaotic moments of leaning 'to fly and arriving in Neverland, the return home, and many moments in between.

March to the Scaffold' from "Symphonie Fantastique"

French composer Hector Berlioz (1803-1869) is a unique figure in music history, in that he never mastered one single instrument, dabbling in the guitar and flute early in his life. He initially studied medicine before leaving school to become a composer, and his most famous work is among his earliest: the Symphonie Fantastique.

The "March to the Scaffold" is the fourth of five movements in the Symphonie Fantastique. The symphony as a whole tells the story, in music, of a troubled young artist and his quest for his true love. The true love is represented musically by a melody known as the idee fixe (fixed idea). This melody appears in every movement of the symphony.

The fourth movement, the March to the Scaffold, takes on a nightmarish character: having taken opium, the young artist dreams that he has killed his true love and is about to be executed for his crime. This movement thus depicts the artist's forced march through an enthusiastic crowd, to the scaffold. The idee fixe appears only once, as a sudden remeniscence just before the guillotine strikes the young man's head right off and the movement comes to a perversely joyous conclusion.

Inner Angels

Elena Kats-Chernin, born in 1957 in Tashkent (Uzbekistan), is one of Australia's most loved classical composers. With her unique use of instruments, beautiful melodies and propulsive patterns lend her music to dance and story telling, which is clearly heard in her most beloved piece Eliza Aria from her Wild Swans ballet.

This work was inspired by Tolstoy's short story that retells the tale of the Good Samaritan, in which a fallen angel is befriended by a shoemaker who rescues him from homelessness and destitution. The Angel stays with him for six years until he finds the answers to three questions which allow him to be an angel again. He then grows back his wings enabling him to return to heaven.

In the first movement, in the midst of a bitter winter, the shoemaker encounters a poor man during a freezing blizzard. Realising he will not survive in the snow, he brings the fallen angel home, sharing last breadcrumbs with his unexpected guest. In the second movement, a waltz, the shoemaker and the fallen angel begin to work together, falling into a productive dance-like working rhythm. In the third and final movement, the Angel comes to find the answers to the three significant questions.

He comes to realise that at the core of human existence is love, especially love for others. It is the love within us that is our Inner angel.

Till Eulenspiegel's Merry Pranks

Born into a musical family in Munich on June 11 1864, Strauss displayed precocious talent from a young age. Strauss began composing at the age of six, and by his teens, he was already performing as a pianist and violinist.

Till Eulenspiegel was an actual historical character of the 14th century. His reputation for practical jokes and roguish adventures defying all authority were documented in German literature of the early 16th century. Richard Strauss originally became interested in Till as the subject of an opera. However, the failure of a previous opera put him off the idea and he reshaped his ideas into the tone poem we know today. By May 1895, he had completed the score to Till Eulenspiegel's Merry Pranks, which was destined to become one of his best-loved orchestral works.

Till's first adventure comes with a "Hop! On horseback straight through the market women." Till rides destructively, creating confusion and escaping "off and away in seven-league boots." He checks to see if the coast is clear then reappears. "Dressed as a priest, he oozes unction and morality.

Yet the rogue peeps out of the big toe." Suddenly, "he is seized with a horrid premonition about the outcome of his mockery of religion." Next comes "Till the cavalier, exchanging sweet courtesies with beautiful girls," until he falls in love and learns that "a delicate jilt is still a jilt. He vows he will take revenge on all mankind." Till then finds himself in the midst of learned academics. "After he has posed a few atrocious theses to the philistines, he leaves them to their fate dumbfounded."

The final section works up to Till's trial for blasphemy during which he is "still whistling to himself with indifference." The sentence is passed, and Strauss portrays the execution in grisly detail. "Up the ladder with him! There, he dangles; the breath leaves his body; the last convulsion and Till's mortal self is finished." In an epilogue, the "Once upon a time" music returns, as if to say that this has been merely an entertaining tale.
